**EEDHS MEETING: Monday, 3 April, 2023** 

Speaker: John McAlpine.

Topic: The Churchyard of St Peter's Church, Onehunga.

John and his late wife Jenny were co-Vicars of this parish for some years. Two sets of John's great grandparents came to New Zealand in 1840 – the Kilgours (Scotland) and Raleys (Ireland). There are a number of family graves in St Peter's Churchyard from the 1850s, but unfortunately, large amounts of burial information are missing, and which are needed to prove authenticity.

The first Vicar of St Peter's was Arthur Guyon Purchas, who was the incumbent for 27 years. He was known as a Jack-of-all-trades, was a qualified medical doctor and could put his hand to most things. St Peter's acted as a public cemetery with the last burials being in 1960. There are about one hundred headstones, but around 1000 people were interred there. Other denominations used the cemetery, the Presbyterians had very good records, but some others left little or no information about the people who were buried there.

John set up a website and worked on names – at least one quarter were children, and a number of Fencible settlers were buried there. In 1854 there was a sailing from Australia and on arrival a camp was set up from the ship, which evidently brought sickness with it because many children died and are probably buried in a mass grave. The families initially lived in corrugated iron barns. Some suicides were buried there but this was always a difficult matter because of the doctrine of the Church.

The Chaplain of the "Orpheus", wrecked on Manukau Harbour, was the only person from that ship to be buried in St Peter's. A member of the Bray Family killed in the wreck of the "Wairarapa" on Great Barrier Island was also buried there.

**President Eric Laurenson** thanked John for his interesting talk and wished him well for his future research. The meeting was closed at 4.10pm, after which refreshments were enjoyed by those present.
